



First Responder Network Authority (FirstNet) Weekly Update to the State Single Points of Contact (SPOCs)– February 2, 2015

FirstNet News

- This week, FirstNet will be at the Tri-state Tribal Symposium (concurrent with Affiliated Tribes of Northwest Indians), the Wyoming Telecommunications Association Winter Meeting and at TESSCO Technologies Innovation Showcase.
- We completed the final January monthly SPOC/SWIC calls with regions 5 and 9 last week. A total of 46 states and 95 state team members participated in January's ten regional calls.
- We conducted the Kentucky initial consultation meeting on January 28. Nearly 50 public safety stakeholders attended the meeting, including representatives from Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, and Tennessee.
- Upcoming initial consultation meetings are: Texas (2/11-2/12), Delaware (2/19), Wyoming (2/25), Arkansas (3/4), Massachusetts (3/12), Nebraska (3/18-3/19), Washington DC (3/26), South Dakota (4/1), North Carolina (4/23) and South Carolina (4/29).
- To date, FirstNet has received completed consultation checklists from 46 of 56 states and territories: Alabama, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Guam, Hawaii, New Hampshire, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Puerto Rico, Rhode Island, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, U.S. Virgin Islands, Utah, Vermont, Washington, Washington DC, West Virginia, Wisconsin, Wyoming.
- As discussed on the January 8th webinar, FirstNet sent out letters to 566 federally-recognized Indian Tribes on January 30, 2015, for the purposes of initiating formal government-to-government consultation, as required under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA). Under NHPA, FirstNet is required to consult with all tribes regarding any action or "undertaking" that may have the potential to impact present-day or historic tribal lands or resources; in this case, the undertaking is the design, construction, and deployment of the nationwide public safety broadband network. This letter was sent to Tribal Historic Preservation Officers (THPOs) or tribal

leaders, as appropriate. The formal government-to-government consultation required under Section 106 of the NHPA is not intended to substitute for or replace consultation with the State Single Points of Contact required under FirstNet's statute; rather it is a parallel statutory obligation. ***We have attached a template letter for your reference, as well as a list of tribes that were contacted.***

- The next FirstNet Board and Committee meetings will be **March 24-25** at the Department of Commerce headquarters building in Washington DC. More information regarding registration and the agenda will be forthcoming.

From the States and PSAC Organizations

- This week FirstNet will be at the Michigan Statewide Interoperability Communications Training Conference and the Alaska Fire Chiefs Association Leadership Summit.
- The PSAC is establishing two work groups to address its two recent assignments to provide advice and recommendations on priority and preemption and public safety grade.

Signed into law in 2012, the Middle Class Tax Relief and Job Creation Act created the First Responder Network Authority (FirstNet). The law gave FirstNet the mission to build, operate and maintain the first high-speed, nationwide wireless broadband network dedicated to public safety. While the project is in the process of developing a business plan and expanding its staff, it has been gaining tremendous traction these days.

On January 14, members of the FirstNet team met with numerous local, state, federal and tribal public safety practitioners – including those from law enforcement, fire, and EMS – about planning for the nationwide public safety broadband network (NPSBN) in Colorado. Overall, more than 120 representatives from the state’s public safety and private sector communities participated in the initial consultation meeting – FirstNet’s 11th to date.
